

Outings Coordinator

The first outing in February was to see Chicago at the Congress Theatre Eastbourne, a review of this is below. In March we are going to Hughenden Manor. At the time of writing our April visit to Hatchlands Park is almost full, but if you wish to go on this outing please see the application form in February's newsletter.

In May we will be going to see two beautiful gardens, starting with a private garden at Leonardslee Lakes, Lower Beeding famed for their outstanding Rhododendrons, Azaleas, Camellias, Magnolias, Bluebells and beautiful ornamental rock garden. There are numerous walks to explore through the 240 acres of Grade One listed gardens, parkland, lawns and forest areas with an abundance of fascinating fauna as well as flora. There is a rare colony of wallabies introduced in 1889 as well as several species of deer.

There is also a dolls' house exhibition which depicts the Edwardian estate and surrounding villages. They have a sculpture park and art gallery which is included in the price of the garden ticket.

There is also a free buggy service around the lower garden and lake on a first come first served basis. Refreshments are served at the Clocktower Cafe and Farm shop. Only picnics bought from the Farm shop can be eaten in the gardens.



In the afternoon we will take the coach to another beautiful garden at **Nymans** which is just 3 miles away. Nymans is a National Trust house with a garden for all seasons, extensive yet intimate, set around a romantic house and partial ruins. We should see blossom, bulbs and stunning corners through stone archways and walk along tree-lined avenues surrounded by the lush countryside of the Sussex Weald.

The Pavilion cafe serves tempting treats and hot and cold meals throughout the day.

Unfortunately the house is temporarily closed till the end of July due to renovations, but this will not spoil the visit because Nymans is noted for its beautiful garden.

"A Murder Is Announced".




The ceiling in the TW Opera House.

The Tea Team try out one of the Little Books of Interesting Walks

On a pleasant day in January, ten Tea Ladies and one Tea gentleman embarked on a gentle stroll in the Camden Road area, starting at the Precinct end. In Decimus Burton's time, Camden Road was known as Calverley Quarry Lane.

We stopped to look at the Victoria Snooker Centre, built in 1878 with elephants' heads above the door and previously the Friendly Societies' Hall. Further down, the entrance to Market Square was once the start of Victoria Road, re-sited to the Garden Road junction. What was The Foresters' Arms on the corner is now a tattoo parlour! On the other corner is the now closed Crystal Palace.

Further along is the Masjid Al-Noor Mosque once yet another pub, The Roebuck. Next door is Helios, a homeopathic shop, but once a small cinema! Who can remember that?!

We walked up Stone Street a unique illustration of the class system, where brick artisan cottages suddenly changed into villa residences with classical features of the time. We stopped to admire what is a reflection of the fashionable Arts and Crafts movement.



Following a narrow path, we emerged opposite St. James's Church, opened in 1862. It was then a walk down Beulah Road to Camden Road where there is the Gower Fountain at the junction with Albion Road. We saw the area once occupied by a power station, a coal wharf, water works, Baltic Sawmills and High Brooms Brickworks. Turning into Stanley Road, we stopped to admire the dominating and vast St. Barnabas' Church, all light, colour and drama. In Commercial Road, there is a simple chapel with a total immersion baptism pool under the floor.



Walking back towards the town centre, we stopped again to look at the charming Hill Street cottages facing the former Mission Hall with 1873 above the archway.

We ended our interesting and informative walk in Fenwicks for a welcome cuppa.



Last Month's Talk

David Tadd The Forensic Response to the South East Asian Tsunami

Mass Disaster is officially defined by the presence of more than two bodies but is usually significantly more. It can be 'open' where you don't know who the people could be, as in a train crash, or 'closed' where you have a list of names, as in a plane crash. The causes can be criminality, terrorism or natural.

The 2004 Tsunami on Boxing Day was an open, natural, mass disaster.

This was an unillustrated talk for obvious reasons. However David kept us rivetted during what was a gruelling and often gruesome talk. It was incredibly interesting to follow the process for sending a support team to Thailand and how they worked once there. The Foreign Office decided to provide a small team to help assess the situation and deal with survivors. They had very little time to prepare and flew out to Phuket on New Year's Day.

There were teams from around the world helping and it was very chaotic. Bodies were still being collected 8 days after the tsunami and were piled high in a temple. The priority was to bag up the bodies and put them in cold storage containers. There were 5,600 bodies to process and so the post-mortem teams started. They described each body and gave them reference numbers, jewellery was removed and bagged up, fingerprints, dental records, and DNA bone samples were taken.

Back in the UK a Casualty Bureau was set up to identify missing persons who could have been caught up in the Thai disaster. In the first 48 hours they received 180,000 calls. After a lot of work they identified 183 people who were there at the time but unaccounted for. The next task was to collect samples of fingerprints, DNA and dental records from the families, houses, workplaces etc. of those victims to cross reference with the evidence collected in Phuket. This was 10 month's work.

The teams working in Thailand were rotated every three weeks as the work was physically and mentally, tiring and gruelling. Over 2,000 officers from all over the UK helped to identify the bodies. Repatriation of the dead is a process rife with red tape and with so many it was imperative that each person was reunited with the correct family. This took another 14 months to complete.

Out of the 183 UK citizens named on that initial list only 6 could not be identified. All the victims were given the same cause of death – drowning.
