DIGITAL IMAGING INTERMEDIATE GROUP II

After coffee and biscuits and clement weather prevailing, the Group set off for Eltham Palace Gardens in the Royal Borough of Greenwich.

The original palace passed to the Crown in 1305 and remained a Royal Residence until the 16thC. Not only was it Henry IV's favourite palace, it hosted Manuel II Palaiologos, the only Byzantine Emperor ever to visit England.

Tudor Courts often used Eltham Palace for their festive gatherings but during the English Civil War, the surrounding parks were denuded of trees and deer and the palace, then in ruinous state, was bestowed by Charles II upon John Shaw for whom the title of Best-Shaw Baronetcy was created. It passed to his descendants until as late as 1893.



In the 1930s the current house was built on the site of the original and it incorporates the Great Hall, the **third-largest hammerbeam roof** in England.

In 1933, Stephen Courtauld (younger brother of Samuel Courtauld who founded the Courtauld Institute of Art) and his wife Virginia acquired the lease and restored the Great Hall, adding a minstrel's gallery, and refurbishing the interior in art-deco style. Despite being badly damaged by German incendiary bombs during the war, the family remained there until 1944 leaving the Palace in the hands of the Royal Army Educational Corps from 1945 to 1992.



Since 1995, English Heritage have managed the Palace and effected extensive repairs to the interior and the gardens.

Come 14.15, our Group was able to have lunch at the Miller & Carter Steakhouse, Bexleyheath, a dining experience not to be missed.


A REPORT ON THE MARCH MONTHLY MEETING

The Origin and Meaning of Nursery Rhymes

In this talk by Dr Linda Hall which was accompanied by numerous slides, we learnt that nursery rhymes were initially preserved by the oral tradition rather than being written down which explains why there are often many variants. Early ones probably had a hidden religious meaning, later ones becoming more educational - through counting for instance - and later still just for entertainment, although throughout there was often a moral to the tale. More recently still one's interpretation would be governed more by the artist's depiction which could vary from the macabre to more child-like humour. Behind all this one must remember they were told by adults not always with children in mind.

Cunning Regal Women: English queens before Elizabeth I

The most famous iconic queen in our history is surely Elizabeth I, but what of the women who came before her: Matilda, the daughter of Henry I; Eleanor of Aquitaine, wife of Henry II; Isabella of France, wife of Edward II; Margaret of Anjou, wife of Henry VI; and Mary Tudor, Henry VIII's daughter? During this seminar we will examine their legacy and evaluate their relationships, marriages, successes and failures and the context in which they found themselves, heiresses or married to ruling kings.

The speaker for this seminar is Dr Julia Cruse, who spoke to us two years ago about Tudor England and we are delighted she has agreed to return.

Mary was a severe monarch and a military failure but does she deserve the sobriquet 'Bloody Mary' or is it fairer to see her as a pioneer who courageously fought for her right to be Queen?

A Visit to Polesden Lacey, A National Trust Property near Dorking

The outing for June takes us to **Polesden Lacey**, the lavish country retreat of Mrs. Greville, a vivacious socialite who rubbed shoulders with the best in Edwardian high society. **Polesden Lacey** was a party house. Set within a quintessential English garden, it speaks of the many aspects of Edwardian social life, from the art of royal hospitality to life in service. The future King George VI and Queen Elizabeth spent their honeymoon here.

Indoors, there are opulent collections of Fabergé, maiolica and fine art, including a world-renowned collection of Dutch Old Master paintings. Outside, the rose garden, herbaceous borders and the Long Walk offer opportunities for gentle exploration.

On arrival at **Polesden Lacey**, there will be time for a coffee, before the first guided tour of the house at 11.15 am. The second tour will commence at 11.45 am. Lunch will be free flow. The Granary Café and Cowshed Coffee Shop offer seasonal dishes, snacks, coffee. The afternoon is free for you to explore as you wish.
