



The **Bee Walkers** have started their 2023 Bumblebee counting season, despite March's wet and windy weather. Bees spotted –1.





London Explorers 2 Despite the dreadful weather forecast we were lucky to have no more than a light sprinkle of drizzle on our walk from Kensington High Street to Leighton House. On the way we passed pretty walled gardens filled with blossom: magnolias, early flowering cherries and camellias. All benefiting from London's more clement climate.

Leighton House, since our last enjoyable visit in 2019, has had a big refurbishment which includes a new light-filled coffee shop overlooking the garden.

We watched a video of the history of Sir Frederick Leighton, and the development of the house, which he built on an empty plot in 1864. The house evolved into a palace of art, combining domestic accommodation, a large painting studio, spaces for entertainment and a setting for his collections. It has had many new recent acquisitions to admire and enjoy. This house was amongst a collection of 9 purpose-built studio-houses built in close proximity on Holland Park Road and Melbury Road, but today only 3 are left. It must have been a thriving artistic community in the nineteenth century.





Our second visit was to another nearby property: Sambourne House. This was bought in 1874 by illustrator and cartoonist Linley Sambourne shortly after his marriage to Marion Herapath. They raised their family here and stayed for the rest of their lives.

After their deaths the house was maintained by their two children, and then their grand-daughter Anne, Countess of Rosse, who has worked to preserve the house as a museum. It looks very much as it did when Marion and Linley lived there and is a fascinating glimpse into life in the late Victorian/Edwardian era.

Last month's talk

The Good, the Bad and the Ugly by Christoph Bull



This intriguing talk about Kent Libraries was certainly not dry and dusty as one might think, but full of information with a fund of stories and amusing details about life within the library system gleaned over his 35 years experience.

His first picture showed us a Victorian workhouse between, on one side the Red Lion pub with a local drunk leaning on the wall, and on the other an early reading room. This needed no explanation! Victorians were keen to educate folk and from 1850 onwards some local towns and villages funded libraries, mostly reference, for their residents - an early 'google'! In 1921 Kent County Council made provision for areas without local availability, not always with good grace, from the local council. Elina Busk from Westerham opened her own front room for a library when the council refused to provide, and then

gave money in her will to buy ground for a proper library. Our own library founded in 1920 became the Dudley Institute in 1922.

A huge variety of buildings were used, from some rooms above the local fire station to a converted house complete with bathroom!. Christoph showed us slides of some more modern purpose built buildings that provided the 'ugly' in the title. However, Carnegie, the millionaire philanthropist, provided and paid for many elegant and dignified buildings as long as the town gave the land. Dartford Library is one of these, built in 1916 and still in use.

It was not always easy to borrow books as most early libraries were Closed Access Systems when a reader must get a ticket from a vestibule to exchange for a book stored in the back. The reading room had newspapers and magazines screwed to a desk after the librarian had obliterated the racing results! How times have changed.

Let me finish by quoting Christoph who told us that only illegal books were actually banned and so *Lolita* (by Vladimir Nabokov) had to be on the shelves despite the huge controversy!

Masterminded by the Royal Botanical Gardens at Kew, The Millennium Seed Bank at Wakehurst is now the UK's largest conservation project. We will join a guide to learn more about the work carried out there and also about the history, woodlands and gardens. For lunchtime, bring a packed lunch or eat in the restaurant. We will then travel to Sheffield Park for a stroll around the picturesque lakes, when hopefully water lilies will be emerging - and perhaps finish the day in the coach house tearoom.
