The July outing is to Knebworth House, Stevenage, the home of the Lytton family since 1490 when the house was first purchased by their ancestors. The House has stood for many years longer than the Victorian decoration suggests, the stucco hides from view a red brick house dating back to the Tudor times.

The romantic exterior of Knebworth House with its turrets, domes, and gargoyles silhouetted against the sky does little to prepare the visitor for what to expect inside. Knebworth House first achieved fame in Victorian times as the home of the novelist, playwright and politician Sir Edward Bulwer Lytton author of the words "it was a dark and stormy night 'and 'the pen is mightier than the sword'.

Every generation of the Lytton family has left something of their style and taste making Knebworth an extraordinary walk through 500 years of British History. Heirlooms reflect the family's contribution to literature, politics and foreign service, alongside stories of visits by characters as diverse as Charles Dickens, Winston Churchill and Liam Gallagher.

Last month's outing to Greys Court

The house is no stately pile but a really welcoming house set amongst rolling countryside. From the moment you walked through the doors you were reminded it had been the home of four lively boys, the children of Sir Felix and Lady Elizabeth Brunner, who bought the house in 1937 and bequeathed it to the National Trust in 1969.



Every room felt lived in. The sitting rooms furnished with squashy sofas and welcoming fireplaces, the bedrooms full of 1930s comfort

and even the kitchen was light and airy with a member of staff baking biscuits which permeated the house with a delicious aroma! And all the rooms had wonderful views.

Through the centuries the house has been the home to Richard the Third, Lettice Knollys who secretly married Queen Elizabeth's favourite, Robert Dudley, Peter Fleming, brother of Ian Fleming, and so many more.

The present house dates from Tudor times but the first manor was built on land bequeathed to the de Grey family in the 11th century hence the name Greys Court. The ruins of the fortified manor are



situated close to the house guarding the entrance to the walled gardens which are reached through an arch and parts are still enclosed by the original curtain wall. Each bite sized garden morphs seamlessly from one arch to the next; each lovely in its own way.

We were there for the daffodils and spring bulbs but my personal favourite had to be the cherry blossom avenue a vista of thick white blossoms echoing

Houseman's "cherry hung with snow". A really lovely day.

commissioned a wide variety of artworks. An excellent place to stop for lunch.



London Explorers 2

The morning of our April outing dawned bright and sunny after Storm



Noa, and the trains ran to time, for our visit to Brompton Cemetery, one of the Magnificent Seven built in the early nineteenth century to accommodate the growing population of London. Parish churchyards were overflowing, and private companies hoped to make money from burying



the country, and is now managed by the London Parks on behalf of the Crown Estate. It is mown sparingly to encourage biodiversity and is home to over 200 varieties of moths, as well as squirrels, foxes and birds. It has some very elaborate tombs as well as common graves. Our

guide told us many stories about the interesting people buried there, many were pioneers in medical, science, or transport fields, or artists. It was designed as an open-air cathedral with a west door and a nave leading to the high altar of the domed chapel, surrounded by colonnades with catacombs underneath, which we were luckily enough to enter as part of our tour. Stamford Bridge football stadium, oddly enough, is next door, as shown in this grave! Following the tour we made our way to the pub for lunch!

Last month's talk

The marvellous work of the RNLI

Jan Pierce is the secretary of the local RNLI fund raising committee.

Over 300 people drown every year in the UK. There is obviously a wide range of reasons for this but the RNLI offer a non-judgemental rescue service and saved about 500 lives last year.

The Royal Naval Lifeboat Institute has been around for 200 years, fishermen previously having to organize their own rescues. For 100 years their aim was to save all lives at sea (the UK having 19,000 miles of coastline) but now

encompasses inland waterways too. In fact, the busiest lifeboat station is at Tower Bridge on the Thames. Their boats went out 600 times last year.

The cost of running the service in 2022 was £182m - that is £460,000 a day. A new, all weather

lifeboat cost £2.7m. Staffing is predominantly from volunteers, about 1,000 boat crew and 3,000 shore based crew. There are a few paid roles: for instance, the mechanics who keep the boats in working order with daily checks and maintenance, and the pilots who drive the hovercraft rescue vehicles in shallow waters.

They have six flood rescue teams with specially trained volunteers who are called out to incidents all over the country. They also run International teams which respond to requests from foreign governments. And an important part of their work is in education.

Knebworth House has been the home of the Lytton family since the estate was purchased by their ancestors in 1490. The original brick courtyard house has, over the years, been changed and extended. In 1811 three-quarters of the house was demolished. The remaining wing was remodelled and decorated in the restrained Tudor Gothic style that was fashionable at the time.

Throughout the house the style and taste of former generations can be seen including in16th century brickwork, 17th and 18th century interiors and principal rooms decorated by Crace Brothers who also designed the interiors of the Houses of Parliament. We will have a guided tour of the house in two groups one at 11.45am and the second group starting at 12.00pm.

Visitors with a house, park and garden ticket are now able to access the Victorian Watchman's Tower for the first time. The Tower has been out of use since the 1950's and has taken two years to restore, in order to reach the top viewing platform where you can enjoy stunning views of the local area.

The cost of the trip to include a guided tour of the house, gardens, watchman's tower, coach and driver's gratuity will be £25.
