Caroline Piper—A History of Shopping in London

Discover why Britain is a "nation of shopkeepers". Marks and Spencer, John Lewis, Fortnum & Mason, Harrods..... We take these brand names for granted now, but how did it all start and why were they so successful?

It will be lovely to have Caroline back with us again.

Last month's talk

Jane Scotchmer : Victorian Wonderlands of Crags, Caves and Cascades

Introduced by talks organiser Craig Forster, Jane journeyed through two centuries of garden design influences, from Palladian imagery and the Romantic poets, Empire, the industrial revolution and the early 20th Century. Part cultural record, part social history, she explained how land-owning entrepreneurs made the fortunes that enabled these imaginative, grand-scale landscapes.



In the late 1700s, the 'living work of art' at Stourhead, Wiltshire used cascades of water and classical icons to celebrate the power of nature over man, in reaction to industrial growth. Also in Wiltshire, professional landscaper Capability Brown went a step further, modelling Bow Wood House gardens on an actual work of art - Poussin's 'The Flood'.

By the early 19th century, classical gave way to technical change, with garden designs using rocks and



crags for impact, reflecting industry's hard edges. In Northumberland, engineer William Armstrong and wife Margaret built Cragside, a technically and botanically innovative estate that turned a former quarry, its original crag, into a plant friendly micro-climate.

The presentation culminated in the formal gardens at Friar Park, still owned by George Harrison's family, with a replica model of the Matterhorn. And finally, Bexleyheath's Arts & Crafts Red House had gardens that reflected owners Jane and William Morris's philosophy that nature and home should work in harmony. By returning to the talk's initial focus on classicism, this brought Jane's narrative full circle.



A Review of trips by London Explorers Group 6 by Helen S

2018 Following the inaugural meeting at Trinity in May 2018 our first outing took place in July on a bright and sunny day, where we walked along the Regents Canal from Camden Lock, via Abbey Road, to Little Venice and lunch at the Quince Tree Café in the Clifton Nurseries. This was followed by a number of interesting outings such as the Ragged School Museum, Household Cavalry Museum & Jewel Tower, The Foundling Museum, Wallace Collection.

2019 We started with the Post Office Museum postal train followed by, amongst other excellent outings, a backstage tour of the Royal Opera House, the Poppy Factory where we made poppies, Florence Nightingale Museum and the Old Bailey.

2020 We got off to a good start with The Old Operating Theatre and Shakespeare's Globe but sadly the rest of the year was written off as far as outings were concerned due to Coronavirus but we did have Zoom quizzes and a talk on Bletchley Park.

2021 In February, in order to get the group together again, we did two Tunbridge Wells walks using the U3a local walks pamphlets. Our first outing to London this year was to the British Library, the regenerated King's Cross, after which we went to the Royal Observatory & Queens House. In November we did an Evening Ghost Walk, and the final outing that year was a fascinating walk around the old docks in Wapping.

This year started in style with a guided tour of the Masonic Grand Lodge and Charterhouse in Farringdon. We then had a varied selection of outings including a trip to the West India Docks now known as Canary Wharf, The Shard, Apsley House & Wellington Arch, Physic

Garden, Charles Dickens Museum, Kensington. We had one outing that year cancelled due to Platinum Jubilee Celebrations.

2023 Started with Tunbridge Wells because there were no trains (indeed a year blighted with rail strikes) but we did manage a few outings including a National Theatre Backstage Tour, The Museum of the Home, Tower Bridge, Chiswick Gardens, Amphitheatre at the Guildhall, a walk from Little Venice to

Camden, and lastly Paddington and the British

Museum.

2024 Off to a cracking start with a trip to The Supreme Court, and Greg Clark taking us on a private tour of The Houses of Parliament. We are looking forward to another good year with a very interesting programme of outings including 2 Temple Place, Dulwich Village, Woolwich Docks & Leather Route, Battersea, and Middle Temple Hall.





Walk On The Wildside group were at Hayesden Country Park last month, walking the historic route.

Very popular with the group is the Merlin app from Cornell University, which records birds singing and identifies them. At least 14 birds were logged.

May's trip is to the Brooklands Museum with the Concorde Experience. Brooklands Museum collection is focused on the 1907 banked motor course and its influence on the development of motor racing and aviation. They reflect the history of the UK's world leading motor sport industry which grew up at Brooklands before the Second World War and was still largely focused in the local area in the post-war years. The aircraft collection tells the story of Brooklands' vital role in producing military aircraft in both world wars and the many renowned military and civil aircraft (including much of the Concorde) designed and manufactured here until the last factory closed in 1989. There is also the Sunbeam Cafe where they serve hot and cold food and drinks.
