

u3a Luxembourg Short Break

The u3a trip to Luxembourg was a great success: interesting and informative every step of the way. Even the weather cooperated! We broke our journey at Tournai, famous for being the first Belgian town liberated after D day. Then on to Luxembourg: looking out of the hotel window this was our fairvtale view - the spectacular floodlit castle

A drive through the city by coach and then a walking tour with a super

enthusiastic guide. We learnt that children start school speaking Luxembourgish. French is soon added to the curriculum, then German. English and even a fifth language, Portuguese or Dutch! The cathedral was stunning and we were lucky to visit during a service when the huge nave was filled with choral and organ music and illuminated by the stained glass windows.

We watched the guards patrolling in front of the Duke's palace and then came across this

intriguing Stars and Stripes memorial which you can see in the foreground. Every kilometre of the route the allies took to liberate Europe is marked with these stone markers, 1146 in all. It's called the Liberty Road (La voie de la Liberté).

> Our guide for the Dietrich War Museum was a charismatic ex-soldier. Unusually the museum used photos and eye witness accounts to reconstruct wartime scenes. They had an authentic enigma encoder which the Allies managed to "crack" at Bletchley park using the genius of the mathematician Alan Turing.

On an early morning visit we made our way to Vianden Castle, still shrouded in mist. Dating back to the 11th century the castle is a formidable fortress offering a captivating glimpse into

Luxembourg's turbulent past. It's strategic hilltop location, fortified walls, and intricate detailing illustrates the engineering brilliance of that era.

> We had a tourist train trip round the German city of Trier in the Moselle wine region. In the afternoon we toured the St Martin vineyard cellars, carved into the rock, followed by a generous "tasting".

Mullerthall is Luxembourg's little Switzerland, known for its fascinating sandstone formations and beautiful hilly landscape. Those who reached the Hohllay cave were excited to see the unusual cavern, created by cutting into the rock to make circular millstones.

Finally, Dinant in Belgium - an ideal place to

stop on the homeward journey - famous as the town where Adolph Sax developed the saxophone. Huge colourful instruments brighten the bridge into the town centre.

Throughout our stay, Sandra was always there to answer questions, add interesting comments and to keep a careful eye on everyone. She also had a ready supply of chocolate bars! Phil & Jan Sumner
















Outings Coordinator

Last month's outing to Wrest Park

For over 600 years the Wrest estate was home to one of the leading aristocratic families in the country, the de Greys. Each generation left its mark on the estate.

The family reached its greatest prominence when Edward IV made Edmund Grey his Lord Treasurer in



1463 and then Earl of Kent in 1465. More than 200 years later the formal gardens and the canal known as the Long Water were created by Amabel Benn, together with her son, Anthony, the 11th Earl, and his wife, Mary.

In the early 18th century Anthony's son, Henry, Duke of Kent (1671– 1740), laid out what is now Wrest's most exceptional feature, its massive formal woodland garden, enclosed on three sides by canals. He employed leading architects and garden designers to

create an ordered landscape of woodland avenues ornamented with statuary and garden buildings.

On the duke's death his granddaughter Jemima, Marchioness Grey (1723–97), inherited the estate. She showed a keen interest in the gardens. In 1758 she brought in 'Capability' Brown, to soften the edges of the garden and remodel the park, while preserving the heart of the formal layout. Brown himself realised that to do more 'might unravel the Mystery of the Gardens'.

Brown's work is commemorated by the 'Capability' Brown column, built for Jemima by Edward Stevens. Jemima also added a Chinese temple and bridge, the Mithraic altar and a bath house.

The manor house was crumbling and rather than making improvements to the old house, the second Earl de Grey, an accomplished amateur architect, demolished it and between 1834 and 1839 built a new house some 200 metres to the north. Unusually for the time, he chose to adopt an 18th-century French style of architecture both inside and outside the



house, perhaps inspired by the estate's formal gardens. Earlier he had a new gate and lodges built at the Silsoe entrance to the estate, also in the French style.

When it came to the gardens, Earl de Grey showed great respect for the legacy of his forebears. Wrest was sold on 1917 as there was no heir to inherit. English Heritage took over the house, in 2006 and has begun an ambitious 20-year project to restore the gardens to their pre-1917 state. The house is used for administration and for functions but some of ground floor rooms which are unfurnished are open to the public so that one can have some idea of the grandeur of the house in



its heyday.

Although it was overcast when we left for Bedfordshire and there was a light shower on arrival, the sun did eventually shine.

We all enjoyed exploring the house, formal gardens and woodland not to mention the café, gift shop and second-hand bookshop! Very many thanks to Joan Young for organising such a great outing.

Last month's talk

Janie Ramsay <u>The Lifestyle of the Duke and Duchess</u> of Windsor

Janie Ramsay gave us a fascinating talk on the lifestyle of the Windsors, when they returned from the Bahamas after World War 2.

Initially they purchased a substantial property on the Riviera, the Chateau de la Croe, with 18 bedrooms, two swimming pools, including one on the roof, and a private beach. Numerous possessions were taken from royal houses to furnish the extensive property.



The Windsors became part of the Riviera set which included royalty, Winston Churchill and entertainers, such as Noel Coward and Cole Porter, who were expected to "sing for their supper". They had a lavish lifestyle at a time when the rest of Europe was experiencing rationing.

They subsequently purchased a smaller property in the Bois de Boulogne where the Duke could play golf. They continued to entertain lavishly; the Duchess kept a notebook in which she noted the food and drink preferences of her guests.



The Windsors were obsessed about their "royal" position; they displayed royal insignia and used the title of HRH, both forbidden under the terms of the abdication. They were also obsessed about their public image; photos were vetted by the Duchess before publication; they became fashion icons and influenced trends such as tartan and the Windsor knot. The Duke was in the list of best dressed men for 10 years and the Duchess in the list of best dressed women for 20 years. *Sian Shaw*


We loved seeing an unexpected avenue of Sequoia trees on a hot summer If anyone is interested in joining us please do walk near Mereworth! contact me.
